Security at Brickyard Cove

The owners and staff at brickyard Cove Marina are very dedicated and proud to provide a safe work and play environment for all of our tenants and we would love your help in maintaining this. During this recession, vandalism and theft have risen, luckily our marina has been fortunate in avoiding this effect, still we would like to highlight a few factors that will keep you and your belongings as secure as possible. We have strict rules keeping unauthorized people off the docks and out of the buildings. Only boat owners, escorted guests, approved contractors, and BYC staff are permitted on the docks. Please help us in keeping unwelcome traffic off the docks by not holding the gate open for others who are not boat owners and by not inviting guests to your boat without being present. To go along with this I would like to remind you that our staff is not available to show boats for sale. If you are selling your boat, any potential buyers must be escorted by the registered owner or an approved broker. If you notice any abnormal activity or suspicious people on the docks, in our buildings or on our premises please contact the marina office and we will address it immediately. We promise to provide our best security measures and thank you for your support.

Security Tips for Dry Storage

- Do not leave electronics or other valuables visible. Theft in the local area has focused on electronics and easy to grab items.
- Power boats are especially vulnerable during times of theft. We recommend that power boat owners (and any other concerned boat owners) consider putting a tongue lock on their trailer.
- We recommend that boat owners consider storing items in our indoor storage units instead of on their boats.

Feature Boat: *NATARAJA*

Flying Dutchman 37 of F dock

We left the bay area in April and headed for the Marquesas. The first part of the trip, we experienced some really rough weather with strong winds. The last third of the passage we had really light winds. As the sun rose on the morning of 08 May, I yelled out "LAND HO!" After 26 days and 3,116 nm, we found ourselves off the island of Nuka Hiva. The anchor was down a few short hours later in the main village of Taiohae.

We spent a couple of weeks visiting a number of anchorages on the islands of Nuka Hiva and Ua Puo. We did a number of fabulous hikes including one to the waterfall in Daniel's Bay which provided some of the most stunning views. Anaho on Nuka Hiva is one of our favorite spots and we spent several days there getting to know some of the locals and trading for papayas, mangoes, pomegranates & limes. While in Taiohae we watched the canoe races. Paddlers from all the Marquesan Islands gathered to compete.

In the Tuamotus, we visited the atolls of Kauehi, Fakarava and Toau. There was so much to see and do. We visited a pearl farm, explored by bike, snorkeled, and at Toau we spent time with some locals. Eric went spear fishing with a couple of guys and it was his job to fight off the numerous sharks. They came back with a load of fish which we bbq'd up with our new friends. They took us out on the reef the next day to collect snails then inside the lagoon we collected clams. It was a wonderful experience and we learned how to prepare some of the local dishes.

We had to move on and made Point Venus on Tahiti our first anchorage in the Society Islands. Tahiti was way to busy for our tastes and after only two days anchored off the Tahiti YC, we set off in search of more peaceful anchorages. We visited Moorea, Huahine, Raiatea, Tahaa, & Bora Bora. All the islands offered numerous anchorages to explore and there was lots of hiking, biking and snorkeling to be done.

Three months really isn't enough time for French Polynesia, but that is all you get so when the visas ran out, we sailed off to the Cook Islands. Our first stop was Penrhyn and proved to be quite an experience. Penrhyn is off the popular route so they don't get crowds of cruising boats. It is a fabulous place to completely immerse yourself in the local culture. We spent a lot of time on shore visiting in the homes of the locals and trading for their beautiful woven items. The Penrhyn ladies are known for their weaving and their items bring in big money in Rarotonga and Bora Bora. The locals are very generous and we were given lots of fish, oysters and lobsters. After two weeks, we set sail for Suvarrow Atoll.



This place is a real gem but unfortunately crowded with boats. We rode out a real nasty storm while anchored there. Winds were south at 40+ with gusts over 50. We had no protection and the waves rolling thru the anchorage were so big they were breaking over the bow and actually hitting the dodger! The strongest winds came overnight and that is when our snubber blew up. We quickly rigged a new one and the next morning Eric dove in and actually found our chain hook. Once the nastiness died down, we were able to enjoy some spectacular snorkeling and took many walks around the island. There were many potlucks on shore with the caretakers and other cruisers. The caretakers boys did the fishing and Eric was in charge of the cooking. He did different marinades and even some sushi.

From Suvarrow, we decided to head to Apia, Samoa to do some shopping. Our food supplies were getting thin and we were seriously craving some fresh produce and ice cream. We spent quite a bit of time here in 2002 so after only five days we sailed for the Vava'u group of Tonga. We were anchored off Kenutu Island on 30 Sept when the tsunami rolled thru. We experienced it but never actually saw a wave just some very bizarre tidal activity. We fell in love with Tonga in 2002 and vowed to return. There are so many fabulous anchorages and lots of hiking and snorkeling to be done. The humpback whales calve in the waters here so you are almost guaranteed a sighting of a mama and her baby.

We have been out six months now and have covered 6,396 nm. In early November, we will set sail for New Zealand where we will spend the cyclone season.

Downloading marine software and other files slows the network to the point that no one else can use it. If you are experiencing difficulty connecting keep in mind that all of the masts cause interference, try connecting in a different location.

New Parking Regulations

Due to an increased demand for parking, new regulations will be enforced starting January 1, 2010. Any cars parked for more than three nights in a row will be considered abandoned and will be towed. If you need to keep a car overnight for a period of time please contact the Marina Office for a permit. RV's and Campers will no longer be permitted in the Marina Parking Lot. It is our goal to provide enough parking for all of our office tenants and boaters.
